Smyrna Fire Rescue saw another very busy year in 2010 as we continued to strive to operate more efficiently while responding to a higher demand for service.

In 2010, the total number of calls increased by 7%. There were 5,032 total calls for the year.

During 2010, we responded to 2,985 emergency medical calls, 130 fire related calls, and 1,917 other calls. There were no fire related deaths in 2010.

The average response time for 2010 was 3 minutes and 41 seconds, which was 13 seconds better than last year.

During 2010, we completed a total of 29,064 hours of training. Of those hours, 2,710 were structured training hours.

Throughout the year, we also conducted 23 Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) classes, one Advanced Cardiac Life Support (ACLS) classes, and 3 CPR Instructor class. Currently, we have 56 paramedics (78%) and 16 emergency medical technicians (22%) on staff.

During 2010, the Bureau of Fire Prevention reviewed 226 sets of building plans and issued 90 Certificates of Occupancy. They also completed 2,707 inspections.

In 2010, there were approximately 3,025 Fire Safety Education contacts made. These contacts include fire station tours, as well as visits to churches, day care centers, and community events.









2010 was a very productive year for the Smyrna Fire Training Division. The training division was tasked with providing more in-house training to our personnel during the 2010 calendar year. After developing multiple curriculums, and partnering with The Georgia Public Safety Training Center, we were able to provide 95 hours of in-house structured training to our personnel. This in-house approach is allowing us to provide training programs to our personnel that are tailored to our operational needs.

The training division

was afforded the opportunity to support and participate in the First Annual Metro Atlanta Firefighter Conference hosted by Cobb Fire. The training division assisted one of our own firefighting instructors in conducting the only live fire class during this 2 day event. This event was attended by firefighters from multiple agencies from the metro Atlanta area, and the class conducted by our agency was one of the highest rated classes at the conference.

During 2010 we also coordinated the training

component of an outreach program known as CPI (Community Preparedness Initiative). Within the CPI model, we have partnered with Emory Adventist Hospital to provide First Aid training and CPR training to our citizens. This program has successfully bridged the gap between Public Safety personnel and our citizens. This is just one example of our effort to provide our citizens with the training needed to react in an emergency situation.

BUREAU OF FIRE PREVENTION

2010 was a very busy year for the Smyrna Bureau of Fire Prevention (BOFP), which is responsible for investigating the cause and origin of all fires as well as performing fire inspections on new and existing buildings.

During 2010, the BOFP arrested 2 individuals for arson, one for a series of arsons dating back to 2005 and one for intentionally burning a vehicle after making terroristic threats against the owner of the vehicle. In an unrelated case from 2008, a defendant pleaded guilty in an insurance fraud / first degree arson case in May of 2010 and received 5 years in prison.

In 2010, the BOFP conducted annual inspections on Day-care Facilities, Schools, Restaurants (with liquor licenses), Hotel/Motels, Apartments and Nursing homes. In addition the inspection of all existing businesses within the city limits is ongoing.

The BOFP also reviewed 226 sets of building plans for fire code compliance and issued 90 Certificates of Occupancy in 2010.

In addition to completing the investigations and inspections listed below, each member of the BOFP completed the necessary training to maintain their certification as police officers, inspectors, and investiga-

tors. Also, Battalion Chief Brad Johnson successfully completed the class to obtain his State of Georgia Police Officer Certification (for arson investigation) by graduating from the North Central Georgia Law Enforcement Academy. In addition, he completed the required training for his Georgia State and National Certification as a Fire Inspector.
